What's Your Definition of our Hobby, Ham Radio?

I started asking around for the definition of ham radio years ago as it became apparent that it was significantly different to different people. In trying to understand the definition of "Ham or Amateur Radio", let's start with the definition of the word "definition": "A statement expressing the essential nature of something".

Many people in the hobby gravitate to the term "Radio" as the common denominator. After all, Radio is in our name.

Definitions today seem to narrow things down to what the word has matured to, including broadcasting, communication, etc. Looking back to the historical beginning of the word, broader interpretations of the word's origin emerge.

- pertaining to or employing radiations, as of electrical energy
- relating to electric currents or phenomena (such as electromagnetic radiation) of frequencies between about 3000 hertz and 300 gigahertz
- derived from the Latin word "radius", radius beam or ray
- shortening of terms, radiotelegraph or radiotelegraphy (1910–15)

In 1914, Hiram Percy Maxim, the co-founder of the American Radio Relay League, named our organization using terminology of the day.

He realized that messages could be sent more reliably over long distances if relay stations were organized much like what wired telegraphy had already done. Maybe not now known by the term "relay", the concept is used throughout the hobby from the National Traffic System (NTS) to digipeaters. It is my opinion our founders organizing the participants of our hobby has proven to be critical and likely the tool that will preserve us into the future. ARRL and its members' efforts are key to maintaining our playground for existing and future talented, scientific minds making up the hams of the future who will impact the world as our predecessors have.

The word "relay" in our name certainly does not carry the same significance to most of us as it did when the organization was founded. Maybe our use of the word "radio" in its strictest interpretation has evolved as well. I'm not suggesting we should change our name but I do suggest maybe we should not simply define our hobby solely with the strictest definition of Radio or Communication. As we move our hobby into the future, I speculate there are new passionate interests involving technology related to our hobby. Those who have yet to discover ham radio might be more easily attracted if we create a more welcoming environment.

While trying to understand the essence of our hobby, a look back in history seems appropriate. The study of the physics behind what is today known as "radio" waves, began with the theory of electromagnetism by James Clerk Maxwell in 1873 where he predicted the existence of Electromagnetic waves. Heinrich Hertz's discovery of "Hertzian waves" came around 1886. After Maxwell's 1873 theories, research continued around the world for nearly 20 more years when the French physicist Édouard Branly created what he called the "radio-conducteur". The device he created was a detector of Hertzian waves. The name Branly chose could have been the spark for the word "Radio" which slowly began replacing the term "wireless". In 1895 Guglielmo Marconi's "wireless telegraphy invention", led the way to the first practical wireless communications.

These are just examples of the physics research that would later be engineered into Radio. The first significant use of the word "Radio" may actually be credited to the British Post Office back as far as 1904 in a communication regarding telegraph. Regardless, communication had clearly established itself as a good use for this magical technology fulfilling a highly sought after need.

To further complicate the understanding of the word radio in today's environment, enter Internet radio, also known as online radio, web radio, net radio, streaming radio, e-radio and IP radio. Broadcasting on the Internet is referred to by many as webcasting. Since it is not transmitted broadly through wireless means. Internet Radio" is thought by some with strict interpretations of the word Radio, an invalid use of the word. I discovered that a term like radio can sometimes evolve, becoming technically inaccurate when judged by its traditional standard definition just by common usage and acceptance of a broad portion of society. Have you ever heard of iHeartRadio?

This month, Dayton Hamvention, the largest event of its kind, provided a multitude of opportunities for our hobby. We all owe DARA and over 700 volunteers a big "Thank You" for their tremendous effort putting on this extremely successful event every year. I really appreciate all of you who stopped to share ideas and communicate with us.

What did YOU learn? Keep in mind our history that I just described which shows our hobby began as a learning endeavor. I really enjoy discovering the many new unfamiliar things attracting people to the hobby found all around this event. The important traditional activities of operating, DX'ing, and contesting was certainly well covered. However, we should not let the entertaining aspects of the hobby we all have learned to love to drown out sparks of enthusiasm for new learning opportunities. With your help, we will find more. I'm starting a living, all-inclusive list I hope might help answer the question, "What is the essence of ham radio?" I believe articulating this information will be helpful to ultimately describe our hobby to the world and reach new, yet untapped minds.


Results from GLD-4 Survey:

To much politics.



The ARRL Foundation is pleased to announce the return of the Club Grant Program for 2024.



ARRL Club Grant Program at a glance:

- ·Applications will be accepted between June 3rd and July 26th
- ·The link to apply will be on this site beginning June 3rd
- ·Grants will be available up to \$25,000
- ·Clubs who receive grants will be required to share updates and reports with ARRL
- ·Clubs do not need to be ARRL-affiliated clubs or 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations
- ·Emphasis is given to projects that are transformative in nature.
- ·Examples of projects include, but are not limited to: get on the air projects; ham training and skills development through mentoring; STEM and STEAM learning through Amateur Radio; station resources for use by the ham community; and emergency communications and public service projects that emphasize training
- ·Grant funds may not be used for commercial or for-profit projects

Please post this listing in your club's newsletter and announce the swaps on your local nets. Talk them up. Let's fully support all of our hamfests in every way possible. It means success for everyone. Be sure to invite your ARRL Officials as soon as your date is set.

If your ARRL Affiliated club plans to request Hamfest Sanctioning, you should make that request well in advance of the scheduled Hamfest date, as this allows adequate time for QST Listings. QST announcements require a 3-month lead time. To be fair to our division's clubs, the Great Lakes Division policy **now has 2 requirements** for any ARRL Sanctioning.

Any club requesting ARRL sanctioning within the Great Lakes Division must now be an ARRL Affiliated Club with a maximum of two hamfests/swaps in any given calendar year, and they must be at least four months apart.

If your swap is cancelled or the date is going to change, please notify ARRL HQ.

Youth Licensing Grant Program

Here's one of those little talked about programs to help our youth. I'll be that many of you didn't even know about the **ARRL** Youth Licensing Grant Program. It started in 2022 and covers the one-time FCC \$35 application fee for new license candidates younger than

18-years old for tests administered under the **ARRL** Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (<u>ARRL VEC</u>) program. Yes, the ARRL will cover the \$35 FCC fee for youth who are getting into Amateur Radio

Additionally, candidates younger than 18-years old would pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the <u>ARRL VEC</u> VE team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates under the age of 18 regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of under 18 status is required at the session (<u>what to bring to an exam session</u>).

Both of these programs are sponsored by YOUR ARRL.

Candidates younger than 18-years old will pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VEC VE team when taking an exam. Proper identification must be presented to and verified by the team, per the procedures for all exam candidates (what to bring to an exam session).
